Year P/1/2 Health Education

This week, as part of our protective behaviours program, children learned about 'private' body parts. They learned the correct names for boys' and girls' private parts, connecting these with the familiar terms they use at home, and discussed when it is appropriate for other people to see these parts of our bodies

This is part of the pre-primary health curriculum, but it is important, so it is revised every year. Children are more likely to report inappropriate touching if they are able to name the

private body parts without shame, and using the correct language removes any confusion that nicknames may cause.

Parents may receive some 'curly' questions from younger students, but we encourage open, age-appropriate conversations to support their learning and understanding.

This year, we are using the Daniel Morcombe Child Safety Curriculum for our protective behaviours lessons. In case you missed the information about it that was sent home earlier in the year, I have attached the parent guide to this miniQuill.
