Dry Riverbed

Have you seen our beautiful dry riverbed area, with an outdoor classroom/yarning circle? This has been built by the amazing Mrs C, Terina Campbell, helped by a host of her family and friends. It has been a labour of love and has taken over two years as Mrs C suffered a workplace injury (not from building the riverbed!) and then required a hip replacement, so these slowed construction down

quite a bit! But it is finished and it is amazing!

The riverbed design is based on the sand art done by Bev Ward during NAIDOC celebrations in 2021and Bev generously gave her consent for Terina to use and adapt the design. The finished riverbed is beautiful and adds so much to our playground and learning spaces. Bev's design represented 'Community Coming Together'.

These words are included in the painted stones, and thinking about the number of friends and relatives that Terina has rounded up to help her, (most of them not having any other involvement with the school), it was a true community effort.

Grant successes - Thanks Shannon Kenyon, CRT and Shire of Coorow

If you read the miniQuill, you'll know Coorow's Shannon Kenyon, world's top grant applicant, has done it again! Thanks to her efforts, the P&C has secured two exciting grants.

Firstly, Combined Rural Traders has gifted us Spike Prime kits. These are like big-kids Lego, allowing children to build robots and code them to solve engineering challenges. Champion Bay SHS's technology teacher will lead a workshop later this year to help us learn to use these kits so we get maximum benefit from them. Thanks to Jake Comley from Watheroo Rural Traders for bringing us this opportunity. Only three schools in WA received this CRT gift, so we're very excited! Secondly, the Shire of Coorow has generously awarded the P&C a grant to have games and charts painted on our bitumen area. This will transform the dingy old bitumen into bright and cheerful space. Kids learn best when they're active and having fun. Using a large number chart to jump between numbers or stand on multiples and primes is more engaging than the usual classroom paper-based methods! The games will be great for fitness lessons and play at recess and lunch. Special thanks to the Shire for their ongoing support!

Brain-Based Learning

This year, your children and their teachers have been exploring how the brain works, learns, and grows most effectively. Currently, they are studying the chemicals that help form memories and discovering ways to encourage the brain to produce more of these chemicals. We're doing this by designing our classrooms and lessons to foster positive emotions and by making strong connections between what students learn and the real world.

When parents are positively involved in their child's education - there are many benefits for the children including better engagement, focus, interest in learning, behaviour, growth mindset, achievement, long-term learning, wellbeing and more!

Teaching others is one of the best ways your children's brains can learn and remember new things. Therefore, please feel free to ask your child to 'teach' you what they know about electricity, pathways and brain chemicals. You can ask follow-up questions to have them elaborate further, such as: "That's interesting! Tell me more..." or "Wow! What else can you teach me about that?" Remember: The brain is central to the learning process, so if we're in the business of learning (as a student, parent or teacher) doesn't it make sense that we know how the BRAIN LEARNS best?

Snake Handling Course

Did you know that the majority of people bitten by snakes were trying to kill or move the snake when they were bitten? I am sure that many of you, like me, have to deal with snakes on your properties or in your homes every year. It is not my favourite job!

The CRC is offering a reptile-handling course so that you can learn to relocate snakes safely, without harming the snake or yourself. The course will be held on Friday 8 August. A minimum of 10 people are required before the course will be run.

There will also be snake-avoidance training for dogs the following day, so Rex and Diesel and can learn to leave the snakes alone, even when you are not there.

ACTION Respect

Late last year, our school was selected to be part of a special Education Department project called ACTION Respect. The aim of the project is to deliver better education around respectful relationships and consent.

Why are we teaching about respectful relationships and consent? Is it just sex ed?

No, it is not all about sex ed, although it does include information about puberty in the upper primary classes. Respectful relationships and consent are the life skills that are woven through our health curriculum. They're the things children need to learn to develop healthy, safe relationships and avoid harmful situations throughout their lives. It is all important stuff to know and to be able to do! So we are not going to be teaching any different content, but hopefully we will teach it better, developing teachers' skills, working with our families so that we are giving the same messages at school and at home, and engaging local agencies to help us. We want to develop a whole-school approach that is designed just for our community.

To design something for our community, we need to talk to you, to find out what you want, think and need for your children. We are hoping to gather some volunteers to be interviewed.

What will the interviews be like?

If you volunteer, you will be asked to come in for a meeting on your own or with a friend or family member. It will take about 30 minutes. One of the staff will lead a conversation that helps us understand a bit about you, your thoughts about how people show respect to others, what types of respect are important in the community, and the things you think are important in planning excellent respectful relationships education. (All interviews will be confidential, and no names or identifying details will be used.)

The sort of questions we will ask in the interviews will be things like:

- What do you remember about relationships between kids when you were at primary school? Do any events jump out?
- Who influences your child at school, and outside of school?
- What role does this school play in the way your child develops relationships (positive and / or negative)?
- What experience in your life had the biggest impact on the way you learned about respect, or on how you show respect in relationships?
- What questions do you have about relationships in our school community?

There are no right or wrong answers to questions like these – we are just trying to learn more about the community as a whole. Once we have gathered ideas from the community, some specialists from the Education Department will help us to develop our plan.

Lifeline-trained Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Crisis Supporter who can provide crisis support 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. 13 YARN empowers our community with the opportunity to yarn without judgement and provide a culturally safe space to speak about their needs, worries or concerns.

If you, or someone you know, are feeling worried or no good, we encourage you to connect with 13YARN on 13 92 76 (24 hours/7 days) and talk with an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander Crisis Supporter.

This is your story; your journey and we will take the time to listen. No shame, no judgement, safe place to yarn. We're here for you.

Our vision is to achieve a nation free of suicide. We know the current statistics for suicide and self-harm for Aboriginal people are disproportionately high. To tackle this problem head-on, this service will be led by an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Advisory Board and employ professionals in suicide prevention and crisis support utilising Lifeline's extensive experience and infrastructure.

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13YARN is an Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander crisis support line funded by the Australian Government with the support of Lifeline and developed in collaboration with Gayaa Dhuwi (Proud Spirit) Australia. It is run by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

We have co-designed this line using Lifeline expertise with several Aboriginal mental health professionals including NACCHO, Black Dog Institute Aboriginal Lived Experience team and the Centre for Excellence in Suicide Prevention along with input from Torres Strait Islander, remote, regional, and urban peoples with lived experience.

We work to explore options for ongoing support and community members will always be reassured they will be connected to another Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander person who will understand where they are coming from and value knowing HOW to listen, without judgement or shame.
